

St. Ignatius of Loyola Feast Day - July 31

St. Ignatius of Loyola was a Spanish knight from a local Basque noble family, a hermit, a priest since 1537, and theologian, who cofounded the Society of Jesus (Jesuits). Ignatius emerged as a

religious leader during the Counter-Reformation. Loyola's devotion to the Catholic Church was characterized by absolute obedience to the Pope. He was born in the family castle in Guipúzcoa, Spain, the youngest of 13 children. When he was old enough, he became a soldier of Spain to fight against the French. A cannon ball and series of bad operations ended his military career. While in recovery, he read the lives of the saints, and decided to dedicate himself to becoming a "soldier of the Catholic Faith."

Soon after he experienced a series of visions which led him to develop his famous "Spiritual Exercises." Ignatius finished his studies at the University of Paris at the age of 43. His humble lifestyle attracted several followers at the university, including St. Francis Xavier, with whom he started the Jesuit order. He died in Rome in 1556 and was canonized in 1622. There are 38 members of the Society of Jesus who have been declared Blessed, and 38 who have been canonized as saints.

THE PREFACE DIALOGUE

"Lift up your hearts." "We lift them up to the Lord." "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God." "It is right to give him thanks and praise." With this ancient dialogue we enter the **Eucharistic Prayer**.

the **heart of the Mass**. These venerable words have been part of the Christian liturgy almost from the beginning—by the time of Hippolytus of Rome (c. 215 AD) they were already fixed in the liturgy. Several times during the Mass the priest has invited us to pray. There is something different here. We are invited to be "*lifted up*," to ascend, to climb the Lord's mountain, as it were, to go to a new place for this most solemn part of the Mass. And we are invited to a new frame of mind, a sense of joy, of focused dedication: our hearts must not be cast down, but *lifted up*, and lifted to the Lord. Why? Because we are going to give thanks—we are going to "**eucharist**!"
